



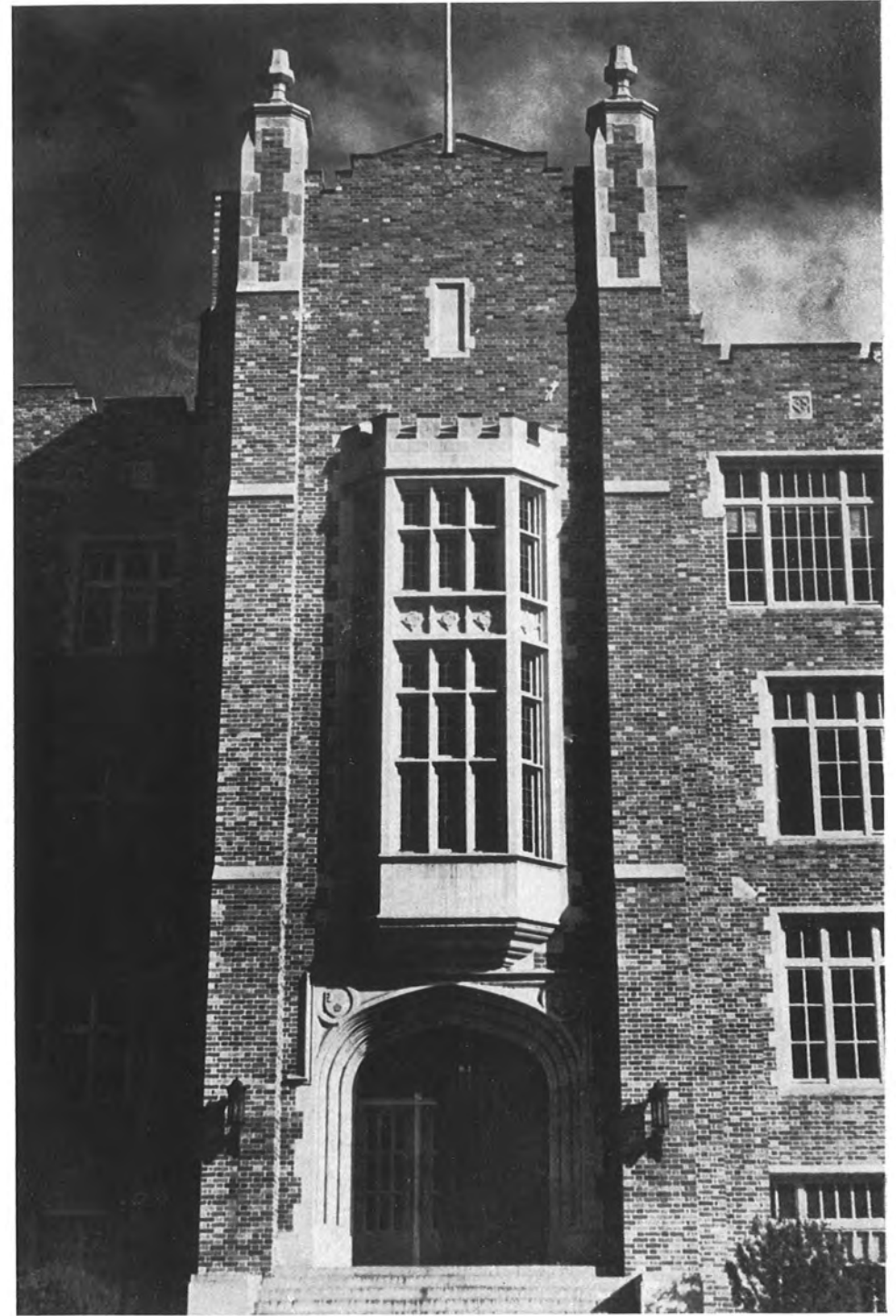

BISHOP OF BISMARCK

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Monsignor Ryan, appointed Bishop of the See of Bismarck by His Holiness, Pope Pius XII, succeeds the Most Reverend Vincent Wehrle, O.S.B., who resigned his position as head of the Bismarck Diocese last December because of ill health.

In September, 1906, Monsignor Ryan matriculated at the St. Paul Seminary where he completed his studies, and on June 7, 1912, he was ordained to the priesthood.

Arriving in Fargo on July 16, 1912, he assumed the positions of secretary to the Bishop and Chancellor of the Diocese.

On November 18, 1917, Monsignor Ryan was named the first pastor of St. Anthony of Padua church, and through his efforts he was able to see St. Anthony's parochial school erected in September, 1922.

Monsignor Ryan has achieved a national reputation in the field of social service, and he has acted as diocesan director of Catholic charities for many years. Recognizing his outstanding achievements in the field of sociology and social service, the University of North Dakota conferred on him an honorary degree of doctor of laws in 1938.

In August, 1939, Pope Pius XII named Father Ryan a domestic prelate; that year he was elected president of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference.

Nationally known in the fields of religion, charity, and agriculture, Bishop Ryan is an eminent scholar and a man of unbounded energy. His ceaseless work has made his name revered by Catholic and Protestant.

Bishop Ryan Says:

Know Your Faith

"The social conditions in which we have been born are a wondrous chaos. Raging storms have rocked our cradle; we have striven through a thousand contradictory theories."

These are not the words of a critic of our own age. They were spoken in 1844 by the great Pere Lacordaire in one of his conferences at Notre Dame, Paris. Among his audience of six thousand were the savants of Paris. Present also were great crowds of young college students, products of the secular education of their age, swayed by mocking attacks upon their religion, weak in their faith and possessing little knowledge of the faith. Many of these young men, under the influence of Lacordaire, were later to become active apostles of the Catholic faith. Under the guidance of this great apostle of youth they learned how solid is the foundation of the faith and how essential is the faith for the permanence of human society.

Lacordaire knew the difficulties of youth, for he had passed through them. He, too, fell under the spell of his age, giving up the faith as a young man. A promising young barrister at twenty-two, he returned to the faith to become a priest and to become the great orator of Notre Dame, a great apostle of liberty, a great leader of youth.

The conditions surrounding young college people today are not unlike the conditions that prevailed in the days of Lacordaire. Few come to college with more than a primary knowledge of religion. With few exceptions, the Catholic student is almost entirely unacquainted with the solid reasoning on which Catholicism is based. It not infrequently happens that the Catholic student's acquaintance with his religion is limited to attacks upon it. His education progresses along secular lines, but in respect to his religion it often remains at the elementary level.

The Newman Club and the Newman Foundation at the University of North Dakota offer to the University student an opportunity to acquire a knowledge of the solid foundation on which religion rests. The authorities of the University have been most gracious in encouraging the work of the Newman Club and the Newman Foundation.

It is a duty incumbent on every Catholic student to be an active member of the Newman Club and to use every effort to equip himself with an intellectual understanding of his faith. If there is any group to which the Church has a right to look for leadership, it is to the young men and women who have the advantages of higher education.



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BISHOP OF FARGO

Whatever the immediate and practical ends of education, its ultimate end is to promote human culture. Without culture it is impossible to have civilization.

Culture, however, is a thing of the mind and the heart. To make the mind of man one with the mind of Christ is of the very essence of culture. For, when that which is best in the mind of Christ has become an integral part of the mind of men culture has been secured, and with culture civilization.

Stubborn obstacles lie in the way that leads to culture. All sort of strange "isms" have arisen that block the onward progress toward culture. In their ideology they are largely of a moral nature. The leverage of religion is therefore required to remove them.

In the welter of a chaotic world serious-minded men are again beginning to see that more than anything else Christ's culture is needed to bring peace and prosperity into the lives of men. To achieve for our students Christ's culture is the prime objective of the Newman Club. It seeks to help them to make of the principles and ideals of Catholicism, the bearer of this culture, a reality in their lives.

We congratulate Father Dawson on the inspiring leadership he has given the members of the Newman Club. In wishing him, as well as its officers and members God's blessing, we add the prayer that they may continue to derive much benefit from loyal cooperation in its program.

Our Religion Courses

PURPOSE OF COURSES

The Newman Foundation attempts, through its courses in religion, to bring Catholic students in a secular university some of the same advantages as those of a Catholic institution. As parents have an obligation to give their daughters and sons a Catholic education as far as it is possible, they should urge them to attend these courses. All Catholic students who come to the University should look upon these studies as among the most beneficial which they can take.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSES

201-202 Ethics (Moral Problems)

Natural and divine law, moral virtues, the general principles underlying human conduct, and the application of these principles to problems arising in individual and social life, ethical interpretation of parochial, social, economic, professional and political problems. A full year course. Two credits each semester.

203-204 Apologetics (Catholic Worship)

Functions and organization of the Church, prayer, the Sacraments, the Sacrifice of the Mass, indulgences, religious ceremonies and practices. A full year course. Two credits each semester.

CREDITS, REGISTRATION, ENROLLMENT

Full credit toward graduation is given by the University for work done in the Newman Foundation School of Religion. The aim of the courses is to study present day problems in the light of Catholic truth and Catholic principles.

Students at the University enrolling for Newman Foundation courses, register at the same time and place, and with the same enrollment officers, as for regular University courses.

DISCUSSION CLUBS

Discussion clubs following the diocesan program are to be organized among students at the University. These clubs will function in small groups, holding meetings regularly at hours convenient for the students.

Father Dawson Says: Study Your Religion

The development of any philosophy of life or religion is based on education. This training may be a great help to the individual professionally, but for success in life it may mean failure. We have learned through experience that success in life comes through education that teaches us to live peacefully with our neighbor.

Europe despairs because of its neglect to recognize this philosophy of life. Our country will fail too, if we do not inspire and prepare our young men and women with intellectual training enabling them to solve their problems of life without resorting to false principles. The Catholic believes the only way to think correctly is the Christian way.

Our secular universities do not furnish such a philosophy of life. It is the purpose of the Newman Foundation to serve these needs of our young men and women through courses in religion, discussion clubs, Catholic reading, and association with a Chaplain. A Catholic must know the reason for the faith that is in him. The Newman Club helps him to keep this faith alive. Students do not always recognize the advantage of this association, and experience has proved that many of our Catholics on the campus fail to practice their Religion.

Parents have an obligation to encourage their sons and daughters to be active in Newman Club. A Chaplain strives earnestly to keep the faith alive. Wise parents welcome this assistance and gladly cooperate.

Fred Traynor Says: **Why a Newman Club?**

The title above might be considered a challenge. So might the statement of a former Chinese Minister to the United States who declared:

"I have visited many of your colleges and schools. My candid judgment compels me to say that there is something here that is lacking. Unless I am grievously wrong, your system of education is directed merely to mental training. In America you have in your educational system everything but moral training."

For 200 years after the first English settlement in America, all schools were church schools. The tax supported school in the United States was unknown until about the year 1850. The first American colleges and universities of Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Dartmouth and Columbia were originally church schools. Today, in the public, tax supported educational institutions in America, there is a trend toward religious affiliation through such organizations as the Newman Foundation. It is coming to be recognized that education without religious training is not a complete or balanced education.

This idea must have been in the minds of the pioneers of this territory in which we live when, in framing the famous Ordinance of the Northwest Territory they solemnly set forth therein this language:

"Religion and morality and knowledge being necessary to good government and to the happiness of mankind, schools and means of education shall be forever encouraged."

The men who wrote the Constitution of North Dakota did not intend to leave God out of our daily lives else they would not have written in its preamble:

"We, the people of North Dakota, grateful to Almighty God for the blessings of civil and religious liberty, do ordain and establish this constitution."

These statements call attention to the crying need for some form of religious instruction in our public educational institutions. No general form of instruction in religion can be framed to satisfy students of all denominations. Consequently Catholic students desire, and are entitled to have, instruction according to the tenets of their own faith. The Newman Club is the answer to this desire, this need. That's why a Newman Club.

Glacier Priest

Newman Club Sponsors Father Hubbard Speech

Father Bernard Hubbard, the famous "glacier priest," will address an all-University convocation in the armory Monday at 10 a. m., sponsored by the University Newman club.

Father Hubbard has just returned from his expedition, the eleventh Alaskan expedition, which included a 2,000 mile trip through the floating ice of the Arctic Bering sea and the Arctic stormy Bering sea and a native 40-foot open boat—a native komatik of flexible skins powered by two outboard motors. Accompanying Father Hubbard were two white men, six Eskimos and two dogs.

STUDIED ESKIMO LIFE

The expedition was based on King Island, a square mile of rock in the Bering sea, inhabited by 200 Eskimos. Here Father Hubbard lived for nearly a month, studying the customs, language and living habits of a people whom the "glacier priest" describes as the happiest and most moral in the world.

To date, he has made 11 trips to the far north, gathering geological data, studying the Eskimos, exploring and taking photographs. His books are widely read and his lectures are popular.

His address will focus on the role of the Catholic Church in society and the challenges it faces in the modern world.

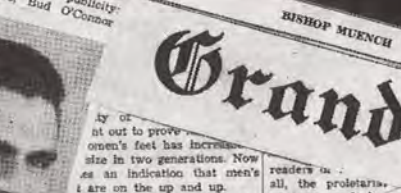

NEWMAN CLUB HEARS

Bishop Aloisius J. Muench of Fargo addressed the members of Newman Club at their February dinner meeting which was held in St. Michael's auditorium.

His talk was centered around his audience with Pope Pius XII, his visit to the Vatican, and his European trip through Germany, France, and Italy.

In his description of his audience with Pope Pius XII, Bishop Muench told us of the Holy Father's kindly, appealing personality. He spoke of Pope Pius XII's grave concern over the peace of Europe which was at that time being threatened.

"I have noted much improvement in conditions in Italy since I was there in 1919-1922. The people were strongly supporting Premier Mussolini and had the right to criticize the government. In Germany, however, the opposite is true," said Bishop Muench. "There most civil liberties are suppressed."

Newman Hall

You may open the door of 315 Hamline avenue any evening and find fellows studying, lounging, listening to the radio, and in general, making themselves at home. Little wonder either, for 315 Hamline is Newman Hall, and Newman Hall is home to twenty-one University men.

The Hall was not always what it is today. In 1902, the Catholic organization boasted of fifteen members who gathered occasionally in Macnic Hall for meetings. The organization flourished for a short time and eventually disappeared.

Finally in 1926 the present Newman Foundation of the University was organized with Father Arrell, C. J. Murphy, and John E. Nuss as trustees. The foundation was then affiliated with the school and students received credit for work taken in religion. Another step in the right direction was the purchase of the house at 315 Hamline. This was made possible largely through the endeavor of the late M. F. Murphy. Catholic men students were housed in the building and Religion classes were held there.

In 1937, Bishop Muench appointed Father James Dawson as Chaplain of the club. Through Father's negotiations, Religion classes were moved to Merrifield Hall and Newman Hall began to take on the aspect of a home. Much remodeling of the house itself was done until today Newman Hall is one of the finest buildings of its kind on the campus.

Last summer extensive repairs were made on the second floor of the hall. The entire floor plan was rearranged, all walls replastered, new lighting fixtures installed, floors redone. New bedding was purchased, and entirely new toilet facilities installed. Rearrangement of the floor plan gave increased room space.

At present, the first floor is divided into four rooms; bedroom, shower, storeroom, and furnace room in addition to the kitchen and dining room. The parlor and library

on the second floor are much used during recreation hours. The radio and piano in addition to the fine collection of books in the library are popular with all. Three bedrooms on the second floor and five on the third floor accommodate the greatest portion of men living in the Hall. A few, known as the "Celestial Potentates," however, perhaps because they wished to rise above the common crowd, are living in the attic. So you see, from basement to attic, Newman Hall is crowded with men who desire the comforts of home and good companionship.

Mrs. Victoria Quesnell, known to the boys as "Ma," is the genial housekeeper for the hall, and unofficial "shepherdess." Kept on her toes to feed the hungry mob, repair a shirt or sew a button, "Ma" nevertheless keeps her smile. All through the year, "Ma" engages in a battle of wits with the boys about ways and means of keeping the contents of the ice box and storeroom safe against midnight lunch raids.

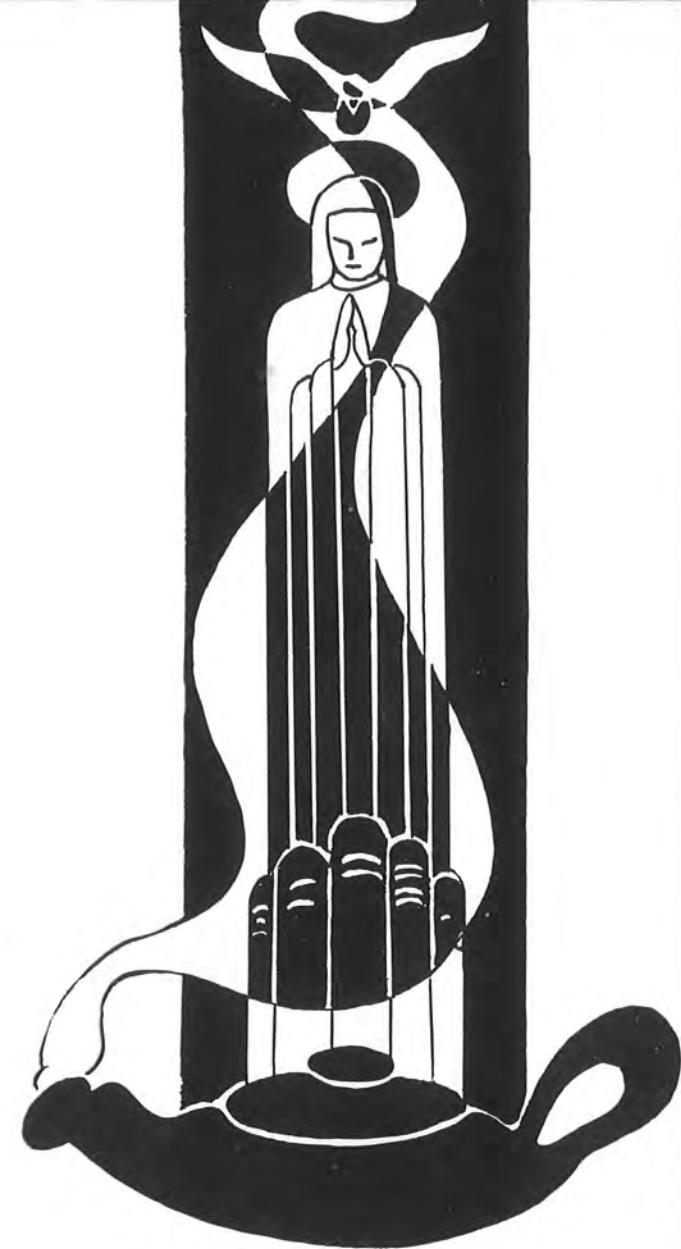


MOTHERS' DAY

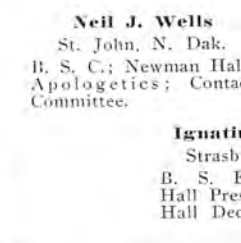
