


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Pastor's Corner



The Formation of a Mission

Being a new graduate and starting adulthood on your own can be a challenge, even more so when you are called to move far from home. "It is exciting but scary, crazy even, but you just have to trust in the Lord," Michaela "Mick" Moriarty said when asked what it was like for her as a new FOCUS Missionary. Mick spent one year in Boise, Idaho, before moving to North Dakota where she "instantly fell in love" with her new home and the community at St. Thomas Aquinas.

As the FOCUS Team Director, Mick is responsible for helping to guide this year's missionaries through this process so that they in turn can lead and guide students in their own faith formation. Mick and the team prepare for their mission with daily prayer and adoration. They meet weekly to learn how to share their faith and life experiences with the students. Then they go out on mission by spending time on campus each day reaching out to students. They lead and help teach students to lead bible studies. They challenge students to make their own choice to get to Mass, receive the sacraments, and pray often. In Discipleship groups, the missionaries form student leaders in virtue and life skills for college and life as an active Catholic into adulthood.

And in the end, they lift these students up to the Lord for Him to ignite that spark of faith in their hearts so it can spread to students all throughout campus.

About FOCUS



Two Lives Become One at Newman

The story of the Jerome Family

As it happens sometimes, two college students meet, fall in love, and choose to get married, starting their own little family. There is much more to the story when it happens at the Newman Center!

Courtney Jerome, then Metzger, began her college career at the University of North Dakota as a faithful Catholic, but didn't really find her own way at the Newman Center until a good friend convinced her to attend Mass at St. Thomas Aquinas and then join a FOCUS Bible Study. Hunter Jerome, on the other hand, chose UND over a Catholic university to "challenge himself in his faith" while in a more secular environment. He also found the Newman Center

through friends and was in the same FOCUS Bible Study that Courtney joined. During their time at Newman, they each began "a lifelong relationship with Jesus".

Courtney and Hunter both sought to grow in their individual relationships with Christ while forming their relationship with each other. After having a "beautiful wedding" at St. Thomas Aquinas, Hunter and Courtney began their mission together as FOCUS missionaries at UND. Their formation through FOCUS gave them the opportunity to "live life in a radical way and to be radical with other people" and helped them "build a great foundation for married life".

Hunter Jerome emphasizes that growing in their faith while at the Newman Center and working in the faith as FOCUS missionaries have together been a real privilege. These experiences encouraged them to find ways to bring the faith into their home. Courtney sees her faith as "something that was given" to her and she looks forward to giving that same gift to their two little boys. The Jeromes choose to make the sacrifices necessary to spend time at Mass and in Adoration with their children to lead by example. The community that they found while at the Newman Center has brought them friends that they will have for life, and in life, as they help to raise the next generation of youth in the faith together.
